ARTICLE GUIDELINES

Journal of Liberty and International Affairs is a triannual (3 issues per year), international, open-access, and peer-reviewed journal published by the Institute for Research and European Studies. The journal also encourages the publication of occasional Special Issues. The journal aims to provide an active international forum for analysis, research, and debate in a broad range of fields. It welcomes submissions primarily from the fields of political sciences, international relations, and law. Additionally, contributions from economics and related fields are also encouraged. Articles are subjects to initial editorial screening and anonymous peer-review at least by two independent reviewers. The length and effectiveness of the peer-review process will largely depend upon the care used by authors in preparing their articles. The language of the articles is English. Articles without positive classification of the reviewers will not be published in the journal. The authors are strongly encouraged to read the peer-review policy section, the Article Guidelines, and the Publication Ethics section carefully before preparing an article for submission, as well as to check the article for conformance before submitting it for publication.

Journal of Liberty and International Affairs is identified by an International Standard Serial Number (ISSN), and each article carries a Digital Object Identifier (DOI), which is a persistent identifier or handle used to identify objects uniquely, standardized by the International Organization for Standardization (ISO). The publisher and the journal have registered a deposit policy with SHERPA/ROMEO. All the articles are freely available online upon publication. They are published under the liberal CC BY 4.0. The author holds the copyright and retains publishing rights without restrictions. The journal is indexed and abstracted in multiple academic repositories and search engines to provide visibility of the published work. The journal is a member of the OAI-PMH. The journal editors share announcements, news, and related articles about the topic of the journal on social networks.

Criteria for Publication

Articles should represent a substantial advance in the particular field within the scope of the journal in terms of originality; importance to researchers in the field; and interest for readers and researchers outside the field.

Anti-Plagiarism Policy

All articles will be checked by <u>PlagScan</u> before being sent to the reviewers. If a case of plagiarism or duplication is detected, the article will be immediately rejected. The similarity index should not exceed 25% (excluding in-text citations). If plagiarism or duplication is detected after the publication of the article, the journal editors have the right to issue a correction or retract the published article. Any attempts for plagiarism will be strictly sanctioned by the journal editors.

Open Access Policy

Journal of Liberty and International Affairs is a fully open access journal, which means that all articles are freely available, ensuring maximum, worldwide dissemination of content, in exchange for an article publication fee. Published material can be re-used without obtaining permission as long as a correct citation to the original publication is given.

Peer-Review Policy

Journal of Liberty and International Affairs is a peer-reviewed journal, all articles being examined by researchers with credentials in the article's field of study before they are published. Articles are subjects to initial editorial screening and anonymous peer-review by two reviewers who will be selected by the editors. This journal operates a closed peer-review process, meaning that reviewers will not know author details and will themselves remain anonymous to the author. Journal of Liberty and International Affairs follows double-blind peer-review policy strictly.

Archiving

Journal of Liberty and International Affairs is archived in the National and University Library "St. Kliment Ohridski" - Skopje, Social Science Open Access Repository (SSOAR), and LOCKSS. Each full text archived in SSOAR is assigned a URN (Unique Resource Name), which is a persistent identifier (PID) that enables unequivocal and permanent access to the publication and its scientific citation. In the case of preprints and postprints of published works, you are requested to also indicate the PID of the publisher's version (as a rule, this is a Digital Object Identifier: DOI). Open Journal Systems supports the LOCKSS system to ensure a secure and permanent archive for the journal. LOCKSS is open-source software developed at Stanford University Library that enables libraries to preserve selected web journals by regularly polling registered journal websites for newly published content and archiving it.

Al Tools Policy

In line with <u>COPE guidelines</u>, artificial intelligence tools (e.g. ChatGPT) cannot be listed as named authors on submitted articles. Authors are fully responsible for the content of their article, even those parts produced by any Al tool, and are thus liable for any inaccuracies or breach of publication ethics. Authors who have used Al tools to develop their article must include a note in the article's Acknowledgements section describing the technologies used and the purpose. This does not apply to software such as spelling or grammar checkers or reference managers.

Copyright Policy

- Authors retain copyright and grant the journal right of first publication with the work simultaneously licensed under <u>Attribution 4.0 International (CC BY 4.0)</u> that allows others to share the work with an acknowledgement of the work's authorship and initial publication in this journal. All materials are published under an open-access license that gives authors permanent ownership of their work.
- Authors are permitted and encouraged to post their work online (author's pre-prints on author server or institutional server only, while the author's post-prints on author's personal website, departmental website, employer's website or institutional repository) prior to and during the submission process, as it can lead to productive exchanges, as well as earlier and greater citation of published work.
- Published source must be acknowledged.
- Submission of an article implies that the work described has not been published before and that it is not under consideration for publication elsewhere.
- Authors are free to add (generate) DOIs to their articles published in JLIA using the Research Gate performances, with putting proper information of the published source.

TITLE PAGE

Article title should be concise and informative, max. 100 characters with spaces. Titles are often used in information - retrieval systems. Avoid abbreviations and formulae where possible. All financial support for the work in the article is listed in the first footnote, the reference to which is placed at the end of the title.

ABSTRACT

All articles should start with the abstract, between 150 and 200 words. The abstract should state briefly the purpose of the research, the research intention, the methods, the principal results, and major conclusions. An abstract is often presented separately from the article, so it must be able to stand alone. Non-standard or uncommon abbreviations should be avoided, but if essential they must be defined at their first mention in the abstract itself. In combination with the title and keywords, the abstract is an indicator of the article's content. Write your abstract using concise, but complete, sentences. Get to the point quickly and always use the past tense because you are reporting on a study that has been completed. There are four things you need to include: 1) your research problem and objectives, 2) your methods, 3) your key results or arguments, and 4) your conclusion.

After the abstract, provide a maximum of 5-7 keywords, but be consistent, and avoiding general and plural terms and multiple concepts (avoid, for example, "and", "of"). Be sparing with abbreviations: only abbreviations firmly established in the field may be eligible. These keywords will be used for indexing purposes.

ARTICLE TEXT

Articles must be written in the English language using Microsoft Word. The scope of submitted text should not exceed more than 30.000 characters (with spaces) including references, which are typed according to the below guidelines:

- The author should follow Chicago Style (author-date system) (http://www.chicagomanualofstyle.org/tools_citationguide.html) for referencing. Example: (Dahl 1989, 45); (Geddes 1999, 134-43); (Linz 1975).
- All references should be given in full at first mention. Subsequent citations can be abbreviated. Footnotes should be kept to a minimum.
- Every reference cited in the text is also present in the reference list, and *vice versa*.
- The text should be written in the neuter gender, concisely, in correct orthography.
- Latin phrases should be set in italics (e.g. condition sine qua non).
- Dates should be given in the form: 26 December 1981.
- Consider aligning tables and figures at the center.
- The author is responsible for language-edit, and also, the article should be clearly andgrammatically well written.

Quotations: If they are brief (3 lines or fewer), quotations should be run on with the text. Longer quotations should be indented, without quotation marks. All indented quotations should be typed single-spaced.

Headings and subheadings: Times New Roman; 12 pt; bold.

Formulae and equations in text should be given separate numbering: Eq. (1), Eq. (2), etc. Similarly for **tables** and **figures**: Table 1. ... ; Figure 1. ... , etc.

Formatting: Times New Roman; bold; size 10; align heading left; single line spacing. Tables must be created in Word, not Excel.

Figure heading is situated under the figure.

Formatting: Times New Roman; bold; size 10; alignment centered; single line spacing. The authors must submit original electronic copies of the figures applied in the article in TIFF, JPG or PNG format.

ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS

Financial support, advice or other kinds of assistance can be included in this section.

REFERENCES

The reference list appears at the end of your article, and provides more detailed information about the sources you cited. Each entry in the reference list also begins with the author's last name and the publication date, so that your reader can easily find any source they encounter in the text. For four or more authors, list all of the authors in the reference list; in the text, list only the first author, followed by et al. It is alphabetized by the author's last name.

When articles, books, or official documents are accessed via the internet, the reference should be formatted as described above; Full URL. where the document is posted should be listed as well as the date when it was accessed.

Legislation: Acts and Regulations

The titles of pieces of legislation (Acts, Regulations, rules, and by-laws) should be cited exactly - do not alter spelling or capitalization.

Title of the Act Year (abbreviation of the jurisdiction)

References:

Title of the Act and Date of publication (abbreviation of the jurisdiction)

Note: Legislation is fully included in a list of references, in alphabetical order among other references.

Steps to Referencing

At the time of reading a document, record all of the information (descriptive elements) necessary to create a citation. The data you record should include the page numbers for direct quotations and for journal articles or book chapters.

The descriptive elements for a variety of document types are listed below. These lists will help you to keep the information necessary to create your references.

Whole book

- Author's surname and initials or given name
- Title of publication
- Title of series, if applicable
- Volume number or number of volumes, if applicable
- Edition, if not the first
- Editor, reviser, compiler or translator, if other than the author
- Publisher
- Place of publication (first named)
- Year of publication
- Page number(s), if applicable

Parts of books (Chapters, sections, conference papers, etc.)

- Author's surname and initials or given name (of the part)
- Title of the part
- Inclusive page numbers of the part

Journal articles

- Author's surname and initials or given name
- Title of the article
- Title of the journal
- Volume and issue number
- Year of publication
- Inclusive page numbers

Electronic documents

Some examples of electronic format documents are internet pages, journal articles published on the internet or journal articles retrieved from a fulltext database. Some documents are published in both paper and electronic formats, for example, government reports and journal articles. Please cite according to the format you have accessed.

For electronic journal articles, record the descriptive elements specified above for journal articles. In addition, record relevant data from the list below.

The following is a list of common descriptive elements you may need to record for citation of an electronic document. This list is comprehensive. The elements you record will depend upon the type of electronic document you are describing.

- Authors surname and initials or given name if present
- Title of the document
- Title of the webpage
- Database name
- Page or section numbers if given
- Format (online or CDrom or electronic if you are not sure)
- Year of publication or latest update date
- Internet address
- DOI

*Titles of books and journal titles should be *italicised*. The use of capitals and punctuation should be consistent and will vary according to the citation style being used.

DOI

- A digital object identifier (DOI) is a unique alpha-numeric string used to identify electronic documents and provides a persistent link to its location on the internet.
- A DOI is assigned to a document when it is published.
- All DOI numbers begin with 10 and contain a prefix of four or more digits and a suffix separated by a slash: 10.1037/0278-6133.27.3.379.
- When referencing a document with a DOI in Chicago style, the information regarding the doi should be given in the following format: https://doi.org/10.1037/0278-6133.27.3.379.
- A DOI is usually located with the author and title information or on the first page of an electronic article. You may need to open the abstract or full text of an article to find it.
- When referencing an electronic document:
 - Include the DOI if one is assigned.
 - If no DOI is assigned, include the name of the database or the internet address as appropriate.
